from your President

Hello Members,

I wish to thank all members who came to our AGM. It is very satisfying to see such a level of commitment from members. I also thank members for the support they have given me as President, not only at this AGM but throughout the last 2 years. I will endeavour to manage TLCCSA for our members benefit for this year as well.

Thanks are also given to those members who nominated for Committee and Office-bearers positions this year. It was nice to see that all existing Office-bearers renominate. Thank you all.

We have a new Property Officer in Larry Coaker and a new (sharing) Environment Officer in Ian Frost, who is supporting Michael Polacek this year by sharing this role. Edmund Morries has joined Larry Coaker as our second delegate to 4WDSA. I welcome these members to the Committee.

Activities continue unabated. The Nilpena Fossil tour is a must for all, showing the discovery of the Ediacaran biota and a new geological time from 635 million years ago. Arkaroola cactus hunting was quite different to Gum Creek and Moolooloo, with the Jumping Cholla being a formidable foe requiring special handling. Further service activities are planned so book using TryBooking and enjoy these unique activities. I remind members that it is now a requirement to have done a session at Peake and Morgan before tackling any trip rated as Moderate or higher.

Changes to the Constitution were ratified at the May General meeting and are shown below in red:

Paragraph 4.2

Membership of The Club shall be open to any person or persons interested in the furtherance of the objects of The Club, provided that the representation of Toyota Landcruiser and other Toyota 4WD vehicle owners is at least two-thirds of the current membership and that the current membership does not exceed (300) 400, but such limitations shall exclude:-

- Life Members
- Honorary Members
- Persons previously dependents of financial members
- Persons who are financial members of any Toyota Landcruiser Club, accepted in accordance with 4.9
- Interstate and overseas members
- Temporary Members (see Section 4.12)

Paragraph 4.12

Temporary Members. A temporary member is a person who has:

- Agreed to abide by the club's rules and reasonable directions
- Signed a waiver in the same form as full financial members
- Paid the Temporary Membership Fee, as determined by the Committee from time to time.
- Met any other requirements that the club may impose such as limited type or number of trips or for a defined period.

The Committee is working on the administration of what temporary membership looks like, and I will keep you informed.

Introduction to the Victorian High Country

26 February 2024 Day 1 - Monday (Helen)

Weather: Beautiful, mild morning with no wind and a top of 28 -30 degrees.

8:00 am meeting at Tom & Rets resort site complete with cabana. Safety briefing and outline of day's activities. Brian & Sue volunteered to monitor Channel 7 for fire activity.


Jamieson is a pretty little town with the crepe myrtles putting on a great display for our start to the day. Rolled out at 8:40 am towards Mansfield. Route included Jamieson, Merrijig, Tomahawk Hut, Toombullup, Tolmie, Mansfield, Jamieson, a total distance of 155 km.

First stop – traffic light at roadworks! (just before turnoff to Merrijig) Tom had planned this trip as a nice, easy introduction to the tracks of the high country. We headed to Merrijig through the beautiful Sebels? Pinnacle Valley heading towards the majestic rolling hills. Grazing land either side with lots of cattle and sheep. Before long, we came to the first road closure which meant a left turn onto Hearns Road crossing the Delatite

We were not far from Mt Buller and drove to Sawmill Settlement where we aired down to 20-22 psi for the tracks ahead. I noted the congregations of letterboxes at road junctions as self-respecting posties would not go up those hills just to deliver mail.



We turned onto Carters Road heading into the Mansfield State Forest (a logging track) and wound our way through some magnificent forest with Alpine Ash, and Stringy Bark, until we reached Tomahawk Hut where we had our first break for morning tea. This was a great spot for a group photo; Sue obliged with her phone and Harrison fired up his drone and amused and impressed the rest of us with his skill.



the Kelly tree was out there somewhere – infamous for the shooting of three state troopers in 1878. We took Tom's word for it as we couldn't spot it.

Not long after this we went over the first of several whoop-de-doos, which were mounds made for water runoff, apparently. The convoy turned onto Evans Creek Road and after one slight misdirection where Graeme and Helen went up a graded track instead of the road, all continued on. Evans Creek Hut on the right. The next track was Combatang Road which we followed for about 10 km until we passed through Toombullup. Some noted a private property sign and fence to the left, a densely wooded area, with Rets suggesting it may well have been a nudist colony – wouldn't be very nice in hot or cold weather.

We reached bitumen for about 100m and were going to take a short track to Tolmie but thought it was a permit only, so returned to the tar. A nice local pulled up to check we were OK and had a nice chat to Tom.

Our lunch stop, Tolmie Tavern, was closed so we continued on to Mansfield arriving about 1:30 pm and had lunch in the town at the Visitor Centre before heading off for the remainder of the afternoon. Thanks to Tom and Rets for a great start to the trip. Tom concluded that some of the tracks were moderate but all coped with them comfortably.

Addendum – When most had arrived back at the caravan park, Sue, Pam and Rets went in to the Jamieson River for a dip. With a strong current and the aid of a couple of noodles, Pam and Sue sailed downstream to Finns Bridge where they scrambled to shore and walked back. Graeme also went in in his jocks for a cooling off.



Day 2 - 27 /2/2024 Tuesday (Sue & Brian)

Today's adventure was going to be our longest planned day trip, so captain Tom suggested an early start at 8:00am. However, this was thwarted by our youngest member being weigh laid in the toilet block. We started heading south from Jamieson at 8:20am following the beautiful Goulburn River valley, passing through Kevington, Picnic Point and A1 Settlement where there is a working gold mine site. After a minor repair to Tom's arial, and in the interest of saving time it was suggested to "Close the gap and have a tight rear end," we travelled along Woods Point Road on dusty corrugated roads.

As we climbed the circuit we were delighted by the panoramic views of the mountains and valleys at an altitude of 1006 metres and stopped at Aberfeldy for a comfort stop. By midday, we reached Thompson reservoir lookout where Harrison launched his drone to capture some fantastic pictures. Further down the track we drove onto the dam wall and

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discovered that the huge Thompson Reservoir which flowed into the Upper Yarra Reservoir, supplied water to the greater part of Melbourne.

From there we travelled down to Walhalla, a very quaint town which has been preserved to a bygone era. The town was established in 1862 following discovery of gold and had a population of 3500. It now has a population of 20 and was only connected to the electricity grid in 1998. The town has recently been used as a film set for Iceman

2, starring Liam Neeson. It was fascinating to walk along the street and read the history plaques of the many preserved buildings and a great spot for our lunch. In 1910 a railway was built to the town and today now operates as a tourist train. We all agreed that we need to spend more time in this lovely township.







We continued on our circuit along South Face Road towards Baw Baw villiage, when to our sudden horror found that our road through West Tanjil Bren was closed for maintenance due to rock slides preventing our planned route back to Jamieson. After inspecting the maps, we decided that we would try an alternative route along Buddy's track, then on to the Amos Link track, which lead to the Amos track. As we headed down this track, the vegetation either side of the road and on the track itself got thicker and thicker, with many stops to clear



fallen branches and obstacles, with steep declines and water crossings. We all became concerned and finally reached a point where a fallen tree and a huge log was in front of us. We had reached a point


where we met the "whereinthefuckarewe" tribe. Our turnaround meant that we needed to make a clearing for each vehicle to make a 10 point turn around. At the same time Brian's tyre pressure warning went off signaling that he may need to

change tyres. He made a decision to reinflate on the basis that the offending tyre had a skewed monitor.

We retraced our steps back to the main road and rejoined the Thompson Valley Road passing through Rawson and across the Thompson Reservoir dam wall. Then it was then the long haul back through dust and setting sun to finally reach Jamieson at 10pm.

Upon reflection, we realised that through a team effort, we were able to overcome obstacles

and work together in a calm manner, what could be considered a stressful situation. There was some lessons to be learnt and we were all very proud that we had graduated from the VHC beginners to the experienced.





Departed Jamieson for Delatite Winery at 11:15 am after refueling at the local station. Overcast, no wind, 32 degrees.

Upon arriving at the winery and admiring the automated lawn mower, the group split up with Simon, Harrison, Rets, Tom, Pam and Andrew doing a 6 wine tasting consisting of NV Curvee, 'Hells Window' Pinot Gris, Gewurtz Riesling,





High Ground Garnacla Rose, late harvest Riesling, 2022 Shiraz and Dev is River cabernet merlot served by Sharee and Tamika (who was in training). After tasting, some went into Jamieson for provisions, others went to the Jamieson Brewery & Grill for a tasting and lunch. After the tasting and provisions were bought, the group met back at the caravan park where some went noodling in the river. Harrison flew his drone around Tom before he swatted it out of the air (I did not hit it) and it crashed into the embankment.

Day 4 29th February 2024 Thursday (Pam and Andrew)

Travel to Craig's Hut, Mt Stirling and Howqua Track - 185 Km's Another pleasant day on the tracks, as we headed along Circuit Road, taking in sights of tall gums, steep drop offs and tree fern lined gullies.

The team were in high spirits, following Wednesday's rest and regrouping day and by the time we stopped for morning tea at Craig's Hut, the setting for the movie "The Man from Snowy River", members were coming up with new names for each other – Tail End Charlie soon became Rear End Reginald and Posterior Paul,



Dust was again the order of the day. Perhaps this could be an incentive for trip leaders – No Dust Flying Up when you are in front! We continued on to Mt Stirling, where the group walked up the short track to the summit of the mountain , 1730 metres, where we had rewarding views across to Mt Buller.

After taking a look at the 300 year old Snow gum on the opposite summit, it was time for lunch. Harrison took some magnificent drone footage at our stops, which gave a fabulous Birdseye view of the area.





After lunch the group decided another track was definitely in order and we tackled some steep inclines along the Howqua track; previous Morgan training coming very handy at this point. We ere soon joined by Lick =hole Luigi (you had to be there, but it is a real place name), and then headed back to Jamieson for happy hour.

11 of the 12 people in the group had a drive today and we were fortunate to find ourselves in a group of positive and supportive friends as our confidence and skills grew, facing challenges earlier in the week had seemed to bring our group closer together.

Day 5 1st March 2024 The Kindergarten Victorian High Country Trip(Kathryn & Trevor Duggan)

The day began with Tom at 8.30 am informing us of the adventures ahead for the day.

We headed north on the Eildon/ Jamieson Road with easy travel on bitumen roads and stopping at Williams Lookout to look over Lake Eildon.

After travelling further along the made road we then turned onto the Mount Terrible track which begins at an elevation of 820 mtrs. The track was quite steep and rocky but is well signposted to indicate the direction to travel. The words of our leader indicate it would be" rocky but doable." Some track maintenance was required during the jaunt to Mt. Terrible and the fire tower on its peak of 1335 mtrs. where we would stop for morning tea viewing the magnificent scenery. From Mt. 
Farina – The Bakery

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

Everyone then returned to the Blacksmith's Shop to view the spectacular audio-visual display of the Ediacaran fossils from the "Alice's Restaurant Bed" (a very prolific fossil site) that was transported from its original location in about 1000 pieces and reassembled on a large special table in the renovated





Blacksmith's Shop. Every piece of the bed was turned over and the huge jigsaw was made level on the table.

The audio visual display was provided from six overhead projectors, depicting the timeline for the development of the first multi-cellular animals in a shallow sea some 560-542 million years ago. Following the presentation, we were able to touch and photograph the fossils. The other tour group

left at this time, and we loaded into the 4WD bus to go to the Fossil Fields. Here, Ross gave us a practical demonstration of how the researchers worked, excavating the beds and transporting the pieces to a site further up the hill where they were flipped over, and rejoined for more detailed study. As we returned to the carpark, the sun was setting with rain showers to the north.





We arrived back at Parachilna in time for a scrub up before our Feral Feast Banquet in the Prairie Hotel. This started with snacks of Emu Pate, Saltbush Pakora and Grilled Haloumi. The entrees were beetroots, goats curd, macadamia, quandong and native thyme plus well we were

offered wild boar ragu orecchiette, parmigiano reggiano & native

mountain pepper. Mains consisted of the Feral Mixed Grill, of kangaroo fillet, camel boerewors sausage, emu rissole, goat tomahawk, with crispy saltbush and red wine jus, plus green leaves & twice cooked potatoes. Dessert was Quandong pudding, golden syrup, pouring cream and quandong syrup. Needless to say, that everyone was stuffed full. A wonderful evening.





Thursday morning and a leisurely start with

many different destinations planned. Four vehicles joined our Brachina Gorge Geological tour using the Discover the Flinders App. We stopped near Brachina East for lunch after photographing the Yellow Footed Rock Wallabies and Jo, Les & Mike exploring a couple of the caves.

We next visited a place where two red gums had grown into each other, While we were there, Jo decided to measure a couple of large gums using "Jo spans". The larger tee was 6.5 "Jo spans" (equal to 11.6 metres in circumference). We also stopped at the Golden Spike in Brachina Creek and the Stromatolites.

The trip finished at the eastern end of the Brachina road. A very full and enjoyable Trip.
