


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from your Vice President

1. Old Ghan Railway Line Pt Augusta - NT Border EOI

Date: Fri 11th - 16th Oct 2024 Leaders: Simon Critchley & Pin Needham

Convoy: (17 vehicles booked)

Comment: This trip is to assist the Outback Communities Authority with the installation of new interpretive signage at towns & significant locations along the Old Ghan Railway Heritage trail to Perdika. There are 32 signs to be erected, at points of interest. We expect to be able to drive to the various locations and erect the signs as part of a new Heritage trail project. The signs are expected to be produced by August 26th.

The plan is to have two groups. Group 1, lead by Pin, will start a day ahead of Group 2 and travel to Copley, then from Copley to Oodnadatta and work south. Group 2, lead by Simon, will be the caravaners and they will begin at Port Augusta and do the southern section, finishing at Copley. We plan staying at Quorn, Copley & Oodnadata caravan parks. 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Ngarkat National Park, Big Desert State Park and Wyperfeld National Park

Date 21st to 24th June 2024 Trip Leader Craig Marchant TLCCSA Members David Burgess and son Adam

Day 1 – Friday 21st June - Lameroo to Big Desert State Park via Border Track

We met at Lameroo at 10am and the weather was a perfect winters day, sunny, still and around 14C. Keen to get off the black top, we took the back way towards the Border Track via Cemetery Rd and onto Yappara Road. The dirt back roads had been well maintained, so it was a pleasant drive with open farmland whizzing by.

Within a ½ hr we entered the Ngarkat National Park and aired down to 25psi before beginning our journey south along the Border Track. It was apparent the track has seen a lot of traffic over the last few years, as it had degraded noticeably since 2022. A lot of wombat holes on the ascends and reasonably deep ruts with numerous instances where you could see people scrapping their undercarriage and diffs.





After the Trig Point the track degraded further. With sand hill climbs that had sizable and continuous wombat holes, we had to lower our tyre pressures further. You had to go

Lunch was at the Trip Point which provides 360degree views of Ngarkat and you can see the Border Track disappearing into the distance.



quite slow to avoid throwing your car around too much, and because of this we were struggling to make it to the top of the hills. The track would be rated intermediate now, and you definitely want a bit of lift to make sure you can traverse the never ending ruts without too much scrapping.



Making good time we arrived at Red Bluff camp ground at 3:30pm. This is a great campsite with newish toilets and plenty of open space that we had all to ourselves. We ended up travelling 90km for the day, averaging 24kph which included about 50km on high speed dirt roads. This indicates how slow going parts of the Border Track now are. Pin stripe rating for the Border Track is 6/10 and we didn't encounter any other travellers during the day.

With no wind, the late afternoon temperature started to drop quickly so we got the fire on and enjoyed a couple of lemon squashes before dinner. We all cooked on the coals, steak and vegetables being the order of the day. Some Barossa Muscat kept us warm for a while but with the temperate plummeting towards zero, we didn't stay up for too long and retired early to help keep warm.

Day 2 – Saturday 22nd June - Big Billy Campground

With a crystal clear and perfectly still night, we woke to a very cold morning with ice covering our cars and Craigs awning frozen stiff. There is a walk you can do up to the Red Bluff lookout, where you can then watch the sun rise and the moon set. It is also a great way to warm you up on a cold morning.



From the lookout you get great views of the Big Desert State Park.



Through the night we had a few visitors walk through out camp with fresh paw prints (cat/fox?) along with emus and kangaroos.



Once our camping gear had thawed out, we packed up and were back on the tracks by 9:30am. We headed east along the Red Bluff Track which is quite over grown on the Border Track end (pin stripe rating 6/10). Thankfully, it eventually widened as we got further into the Mallee country. For 40km we traversed the sandy tracks, going up and down the never-ending sand. This track must not get much traffic as it was easy going, and with perfect weather made for a relaxing drive through Big Desert. There were a few sections though that had some bog holes and dunes.



Not knowing the depth or how soft it was, Craig told Burgo to just go flat out straight up the middle and see what happens.....Burgo told him to bugger off, so we found a way to go around the worst of it.

With no fresh vehicle tracks and still not encountering anyone, we started to get the feeling of remoteness. What was also noticeable was how the wildlife use the tracks to travel along with never ending emu, kangaroo and other paw prints constantly marking the track.

We then arrived at the Murrayville-Nhill road and headed north to a lookout for lunch. From the lookout you get more great views of the state park.

Burgo had put some party pies in the oven so we all enjoyed a little treat for lunch With another great day weather wise we decided to make the most of it by heading to camp with a plan of putting the fire on and having a lazy afternoon doing not much at all.



We continued north along the Murrayville-Nhill road which thankfully had some recent maintenance done to it, as the sections which hadn't been done were very chopped up and muddy. It was certainly fun driving

the sandy muddy road and we made good time to Big Billy Bore camp ground, arriving at 2:30pm. Total distance covered for the day was 87km with an average speed of 26kph. We passed 1 vehicle and 1 motorbike on the main road along with a single camper at Big Billy, once again showing how few people



were in the area.

With camp set up and the fire on, we soaked up the last of the late afternoon sun, as with another perfectly still evening approaching, we knew it was going to get cold very quickly. Dinner was again cooked on the fire, with Burgo and Adam using their bbg rack and Craig the hotplate. Bbg'd steak, sausages and vegi's once again the order of the day.

After dinner we did a bit of star gazing using an app

called SkyView on Burgo's phone. This is an amazing app, you simply point the camera to the sky and it tells you the names of stars, planets, constellations, distance from earth etc etc. Amazing! Afterwards, we soaked up the warmth of the fire, as the full moon rose and bathed the campsite with its dull glow. With the temperature quickly dropping towards zero, we warmed our insides with a bit of Muscat before retiring to bed.

Day 3 – Sunday 23rd June - White Springs and Ross Springs

Adam rose early and put the fire on which was very much appreciated by Craig and Burgo, as it was another freezing cold morning. Everything had iced over and even the tap at the amenities station had frozen solid.

Craig and Adam went up to the lookout to watch the sun rise and the moon set, and it was certainly worth the short walk. With a slight mist and the contrast of light between the sun rising and the moon setting, it made for a photographer's delight. From the lookout you get a reliable 2 to 3 bars of phone reception so it is a handy spot to touch base with the outside world. With the fire going we had a slow start to the day, cooking some breakfast and enjoying the tranquility of the early morning.



We hit the road around 10am and from a previous trip, Burgo knew of a sand dune we could have a bit of fun on. It provides another lookout west of Delisio Track that you could camp at the top of if you wished. We then headed east along Delisio track, initially it had been widened by the Rangers but soon closed in, providing more of those horrible squeeching sounds, pin stripe rating 6/10.



another good camp spot, with tables, fire pits and plenty of open space. With the surrounding hills and pine tree area, you would also get some protection from the weather. After lunch we continued on towards Ross Springs. Some track widening had been recently completed so it provided more easy going sand driving. Along the way we encountered our only other travellers, 2 trail bikes that got a bit of a shock when they came flying around a corner and

We were going to head to Big Dune but having already done a fair bit of sand driving, we changed our minds and continued east towards White Springs and our lunch stop. The landscape along the way changes between mallee scrub, open areas and wooded sections.

At White Springs there is another lookout you can drive up to and once again to our surprise, you could pick up some phone reception. This area makes for





and got the fire going.

With a little bit of cloud cover, the temperature didn't drop quite so quickly and provided a great sunset, with the light changing from light to dark orange and then to dark pinky reds. After sunset Burgo mentioned he had a few steaks that needed to be used up, so the offer was gladly accepted. While Adam did the honours, Burgo sat back and finished his remaining Guiness' and Craig put a further dent in his remaining Coopers. With the cloud cover keeping

found a couple of Cruisers coming the other way! With the weather once again perfect, the opportunity to have another lazy afternoon around the fire was too good to miss. We arrived at Ross Springs camping area around 2:30pm having travelling 50km at an average speed of 20kph. This place cannot get too many campers as there was an abundance of firewood lying around. So, we collected some up,



the temperature from dropping too quickly, we sat back after dinner and enjoyed the toasty warm fire for a couple of hours, sipping Muscat and wondering what all the poor people were doing.



arrived at Mountain Pine, another good camping spot with a nice lookout and spring/wetland area. The bushland having changed from low lying small Eucalypt trees to more open plains and pine trees.

Continuing west, the track remained narrow in sections and the feeling of remoteness remained, having not really seen anyone for 3 days. The further



With the morning not quite so cold, we must have been comfy in our beds as we didn't rise until after 7:30am. Adam once again got the fire going and we had another lazy morning warming ourselves around it, boiling the billy and having some breakfast. We were on the move at 9:30am, heading west along Ross Spring track. Being a more remote part of the park, the track was again overgrown with little evidence of much traffic. Continuing due west we



west we went, the sandier the terrain became. We were now on Firebreak Track, west of the maintained Murrayville-Nhill Road and 20km east of the Border Track. With a lot of low-lying dunes, and clearly more traffic creating ruts and wombat holes on the ascends, it provided for some fun hill climbs. We met back up with the Border Track around 12:30, aired up and headed to Lameroo for lunch after another pleasant morning of bush driving.

In summary, a great 4 days. Perfect weather with warm days and still nights. Plenty of firewood at the remote campsites and no one around. The campsites of Red Bluff and Big Billy had good facilities and were well maintained. The area is relatively easy to navigate but with so few people traversing it, you should come prepared and with at least 1 other vehicle. From a sand driving perspective and putting aside no beaches, your author would consider this a much better area to come sand driving than Robe / Beachport. It would make an ideal place for a basic to intermediate club training trip. Written by Craig Marchant



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
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Moolooloo Cactus Cull 2024

Moolooloo Station is nestled 20km NW of Blinman and 30km NE of Parachilna in the heart of the Flinders Ranges along Glass Gorge Road, an hour and a half North of Hawker and 6 hours (550kms) North of Adelaide. Established in 1851 by the McKinley Brothers, it is now owned by Reece and Tarina Warren who raise Merino sheep and invite tourists to share the enjoyment of their property. Their aim is to build up the stock numbers, incorporate carbon farming and develop tourism with a focus on preservation. They recognised that they had a significant problem with wheel cactus infestation, and



this is the second year that TLCCSA members have assisted them with their eradication program. Ten members travelled to Moolooloo to spend a week hunting down the dreaded invader.

16 June 2024 Day 1 – Sunday (Pam) Arrival

The group gathered on Sunday afternoon, some journeying from Adelaide and others just a short trip from Oraparinna, and the setup was soon done. We gathered in the shearer's quarters for happy hour, or as we preferred to call it "Dribbles", this soon led on to dinner and discussion of the plan for the week ahead. As sad as we were to be missing some familiar faces, our group of 10 fitted very comfortably into the communal area.



17 June 2024 Day 2 – Monday (Pam) Harvest and Welcome BBQ

The necessary paperwork was sorted, and a general briefing done. The first thing to achieve was to find and harvest cochineal. We only had to travel 1 km along the Patawata Rd to discover that the infesting we had done last year had been very successful and we had soon filled our buckets with infected cactus pads. Morning tea was called early back at the shearer's quarters (Chris would have been proud!). The rest of the morning was spent sorting out the GPS units and plotting our afternoon run.



We had a quick stop to hopefully see the devastation brought to the Devil's Rope Cactus treated by Ralph and Ray last year. The group were ridiculously excited to see how effective their efforts had been, the plant now being a dishevelled wreck.

Anticipating our first run near the Nuccaleena Mine Road to be an hour or so, we headed out soon after 12, with a plan to break for lunch after the



quick run. This was obviously on the optimistic side, as the terrain was quite rough, with many trees and creek beds to negotiate around and we eventually returned to the cars for lunch at 3:15! That was certainly enough for our first day and we returned to camp at 4 pm, having treated 172 cacti. In the evening, we had happy hour followed by a communal BBQ where we were joined by our hosts Reece, Tarina and Bailey Warren. A lovely evening was shared, and a brief speech was made by Reece where he expressed his gratitude to the club members for the work we are doing to help eradicate the cactus. Simon responded on behalf of TLCCSA.

18 June 2024 Day 3 – Tuesday (Sue and Brian) Cactus and Quiz Night

A planned 8:30 muster was slightly delayed, with a visit from Reece who showed us a map of the station and suggested a great route for our day off driving day to come. At 9:30 we headed back to Patch A to finish the 2.5 runs not completed yesterday. Chris-time (our new name for morning tea in honour of Chris Adams) was again missed due to the distance of each cactus run. We all gathered for a pleasant and well deserved 45-minute lunch break (all except Simon who had left his lunch behind!) in a creek bed, before heading off to Patch C near the Telstra repeater tower to complete the last run that was not able to be done last year.



Whilst the runs were relatively short, the ground was steep in places and a little difficult to keep our bearings.

In all, 168 cacti were treated with more spotted on the return route to be infected on another day. We were



lucky to have another fine day even though the flies were a bit friendly.

Back at base, Sue once again lit the wood stove, everyone cleaned up and enjoyed happy hour Dribbles, followed by dinner and a Quiz Night. Simon split the group up into teams of 3, The Hybrids, The Top Guns and Da Big Boys. After 6 rounds of 10 questions/round The Hybrids (Sue, Helen and Graeme) won by half a point. A close and fun game showing how little we knew. First prizes were Moolooloo beanies or bucket hats with chocolates shared with everyone.

19 June 2024 Day 4 – Wednesday (Helen) Cactus and Cards

Weather: A lovely sunny day after a crisp start.

After a briefing at 8:40 we collected our GPS and instructions, with the first stop to harvest more infected cactus. We were eventually ready to roll after attending to Brian's lacerated finger (remote first aid required) and Simon extricated himself from a ditch using exemplary 4WD techniques (later realising his free wheeling

hubs weren't locked). We headed for our first coordinates where after some toing and froing and creek crawling, we found the right track, a very nice 4WD ride to the starting spot. After morning tea, the two groups split to complete Patch F, a long but narrow strip which only yielded 4 very small plants. The terrain was a bit hilly here with rocks and shale creating fall hazards.

After lunch we attacked the opposite side of the creek, Patch G. This section was treacherous in places and no plants were found so time was called early and we



headed back to camp arriving at 4pm. Another sumptuous Dribbles session led into dinner in the lovely warm kitchen. At 8pm there was a slight shower of rain to settle the dust, would there be more to come? A few diehards played Five Crowns in honour of Ray before heading for bed to regroup.

20 June 2024 Day 5 – Thursday (Trevor) Day Trip

The usual crisp morning start for our jaunt around Moolooloo Station started at 9 am with Simon



and Solveiga heading out in the lead car towards Nuccaleena Road. Most cactus buckets were left behind as this was a "drive" day. In the morning sunshine plenty of future cactus victims were obvious before we turned off onto a private No Public Access track. Here the kangaroos were everywhere with plenty of sheep too as we drove along very scenic creek beds.



At this stage we were headed to Green Well which we found to be well maintained and with a full tank of water. It was interesting to look at some of the old structures and speculate on what functions they served. We then headed for Hunter Spring Well where many newborn lambs could be seen. Simon very nearly had one to keep as it kept chasing his car! On to Moorillah Homestead, a sprawling area with a fully functioning house (although unoccupied), large sheds and plenty of equipment around it.

Leaving there, it was off to Bob Mooney Well and Hut. The well was in good condition while the hut was quite dilapidated but still rooved. We travelled to an un-named lookout that was great for

views and pictures, looking out towards Lake Torrens. From there we travelled along Breakfast Time Creek,



which runs parallel to Warraweena Station, towards the homestead. After not seeing any cactus for most of the trip, it was within a few kilometres of the Moolooloo Homestead we began to see them again and we couldn't resist putting Cochineal on at least one. Then it was onward to happy hour at home before rain started to fall. In fact, several showers fell that evening, some light, some heavy......hopefully sunshine tomorrow.

21 June 2024 Day 6 – Friday (Solveiga) Winter Solstice



After a night of heavy rain, we were woken by Jenni (generator) to a sunny morning and almost clean cars. After our usual morning activities, we were on our way to work, filling our tyres with mud on the way. Having completed Wednesday's high country sectors we began on the creek beds. Low and behold, we came , we saw and we euthanised not only wheel cacti but several stands of Devil's

Rope cactus as well. This uses different cochineal which we harvested from the huge stand found last

year. Team A found an area of several plants, nicknamed "Katherines Kactus Kluster" and Team B found 3 clusters courtesy of Pam and Andrew. Morning tea and lunch, as always, were in very scenic spots. After work we adjourned to our usual Dribbles, this time with a special treat of Trevor Duggans scones – Yummy! After dinner, for sweets we indulged in another batch of Trevor's scones festooned with jam and cream.

the rest. We need to return to this location next year as we could see many more victims waiting for us on the hills. Today's kill total was 130 bringing the total for the week to over 500– impressive!



This concluded another very successful and enjoyable week, continuing to assist in the critical task of eradicating cactus from the Flinders Ranges. Thanks to Simon Critchley for stepping up as Trip Leader and doing an amazing job and thanks to the volunteers who gave their time willingly in an atmosphere of cooperation and friendship and Yes "we'll be back"!
