SCENIC: Bitumen & dirt roads, limited 4wding, lookouts, flora and fauna of the local area, other points of interest.

EASY: Mainly off bitumen on formed tracks, some 4wding, no steep inclines or declines.

MODERATE: Bush terrain, beach terrain, some inclines or side slopes, soft sand or mud areas, easy creek crossings.

HARD: Rough terrain, steep inclines, steep side slopes, rough creek crossings, possible towing and/or snatching.

DIFFICULT: Very rough terrain, very steep inclines, steep side slopes, slippery conditions, difficult creek crossings, some towing, snatching and or winching.

The Charles Sturt Museum Precinct is centrally located in the suburb of Grange. Grange being the name of Captain Charles Sturt's home from 1840 – 1853. Sturt could claim to be one of the foremost explorers of Australia, opening up Australia to settlement by virtue of his expeditions to the Macquarie Marshes, along the length of the River Murray and into the heart of central Australia.

He was considered a Founder of South Australia as his book "Two Expeditions into the Interior of Southern Australia" led to the English Parliament to determine that South Australia should be settled as a Province under the Wakefield Plan.

Rating: Scenic and moderate

Comment: Your opportunity to visit the world's largest sand island. The main way around the island is via the beach, which is generally easy to drive on, with a 80kph speed limit. The inland tracks can be rough due to the volume of traffic. More remote tracks have the potential to be softer and rutted out, again simply due to traffic and not being maintained.

Start at Rainbow Beach at 5:00pm on August 30, staying overnight at

Rainbow Beach Caravan Park, 308 Carlo Road, Rainbow Beach Qld 4581 before taking the ferry at Inskip Point to K'Gari on the 31st. Bush camping with facilities except for 1 night. Be aware of the dingos. Contact trip leader for detailed itinerary and more information. No caravans or trailers.

Essential gear- Long handle shovel, basic recovery gear, compressor, tyre deflater. Desirable - traction boards. Permits are required for vehicles driving on K'gari as well as separate camping permits at designated sites and dates. There is a ferry charge of \$140 return. Contact the trip leader for more details.

Also remember that Rainbow Beach is approximately 2200 Km from Adelaide, allow 2-3 days each way for this journey.

You are also asked to advise if you wish to attend dinner at the Royal Family Hotel on the Friday night. (It is a short walk from the caravan park to the hotel). This of course is at your own cost. The Showgrounds Caravan Park does not have cabins, Options are —

The Royal Family Hotel, 32 North Terrace, Port Elliott, is 500 m from the showgrounds (an easy flat walk) and has limited accommodation. 9 double rooms, 1 single room and a bunk room.

The rooms are traditional pub style accommodation located above the hotel. There are separate male and female bathrooms which are large and comfortable. Call the hotel 8554 2219 to book one of these rooms. Check with the hotel for current rates. Several members stayed there last year and found it comfortable.

Alternatively, The Breeze Holiday Park, Port Elliott, has other options, from 3 bedroom cottages, two bedroom villas to budget cabins. 85542134. (prices of course vary enormously). This park is approx. 3 kms from the showgrounds so would necessitate driving on the Saturday night, unless we have enough people staying there and we can organise a small mini bus. (This can be worked out later)

If either of these options appeal to you as you don't want to camp, I would urge you to book now. You can always cancel later, both places highlighted to me that this is their busy period and they book out quickly.



Outback Communication gets a bit easier (and cheaper)

Telstra's recently introduced Satellite Messaging is powered by satellite-to-mobile technology, an innovation that can send and receive text messages when beyond the range of the Telstra Mobile Network. Telstra Satellite Messaging is available in most outdoor areas in mainland Australia with a direct line of sight to the sky. The service is included in all Telstra Upfront Mobile Plans and requires a compatible phone with the latest software.

How does it work

Eligible customers don't need to switch anything on. Compatible devices will automatically seek a Starlink Direct to Cell satellite connection once beyond the range of our mobile network and when located outdoors with a clear line of sight to the sky.

The service can send and receive texts via the phone's text app when connected to a Starlink Direct to Cell satellite. This may take longer than

when connected to the Telstra Mobile Network, depending on location, device and satellite position. Hardware wise, you will need an Apple iPhone from the 13 to 16 range or Samsung S25 unit A word of caution in that satellite coverage is not everywhere at present so do not rely on this as yet as a 'life saver'.

Toyota LandCruiser 300 Series hybrid revealed,

And it's coming to Australia in 2026 Toyota has unveiled its first hybrid LandCruiser, set to be the most powerful version ever. Toyota has officially revealed its first-ever hybrid LandCruiser, with the eco conscious 300 Series slated to arrive in Australia in the first half of 2026. The electrified 300 Series is poised to be the most powerful showroom-stock LandCruiser to date, with the large SUV to be propelled by a 3.5-litre twin-



turbo petrol V6 engine paired with an electric motor generator in a parallel hybrid set-up.

While final performance figures are yet to be confirmed, Toyota says the new system will deliver more power and torque than the existing 3.3-litre twin-turbo diesel engine that produces 227kW and

700Nm. Sean Hanley – Toyota Australia's Vice President of Sales, Marketing and Franchise Operations – said the vehicle provides a level of performance never before offered on the nameplate.

"For decades, Australians have trusted the LandCruiser to get them to the furthest reaches of the country and back again – it is synonymous with Australian outback touring thanks to its incredible capability and dependability," Hanley said. "We have always said that Toyota aims to offer the right powertrains to suit our customers, and we are excited to introduce the first performance hybrid LandCruiser next year, which will offer a level of capability never before seen on our flagship four-wheel drive." This development marks an important step forward in Toyota's broader push toward electrification. But for those concerned about its offroad potential, Toyota has reassured customers that the hybrid system has been engineered with, "true offroad capability and reliability in mind, with the electric motor able to provide smooth and even throttle response even in the toughest of terrain".

In fact, Toyota says the powertrain has been rigorously tested in some of the world's most extreme environments, including the deserts and mountains of the Middle East. More detailed information is expected to emerge as the 300 Series nears its Australian debut in the first half of 2026.







South Australia's Fire Services

MFS Station Officer Matt, Guest Speaker at the July General Meeting, provided an interesting and







One of our own members, Vince Monterola is well qualified to comment. Vince has been a CFS Volunteer firefighter for 60 years. He was Captain of Stirling Brigade for many years, his last volunteer rank being Mount Lofty Group Officer. Beside operational duties he was heavily involved in training and represented volunteers on a number of government issues. He was awarded the Australian Fire Services Medal in 2000 - 2009 for leadership in emergency services. for services to CFS and the community

He was appointed CFS Chief after retiring from the private sector and served in that role until being seconded by Government to form the SA Fire and Emergency Commission. During this time he led bushfire recoveries including the devastating Wangary fire on Eyre Peninsula and the Pinery fire in the Mid North. He was awarded Membership of the Order of Australia (AM) in 2009 for leadership in emergency services.

As TLCC members we travel through many country towns and vast areas of rural South Australia. In the unfortunate chance that we experience a fire, collision or some other emergency situation when in those locations, it will be a CFS crew that responds to call for help. There are 425 CFS Brigades located throughout South Australia, all with volunteer firefighters delivering professional fire and rescue services.

Unlike the MFS where all stations and all firefighters are alike, CFS Brigades are classified according to the potential risks identified in their area of response. For example Brigades such as Stirling, Blackwood, Mannum, Naracoorte, Millicent, Crystal Brook, Wudinna, and Ceduna, meet all the risks of metropolitan Adelaide. Accordingly they are "all hazard Brigades", trained and equipped to respond to bushfires, structure fires, road crash rescue, general rescue, and hazardous material spills. Assisting police, ambulance and MFS when required are all part of their role. The greatest risk faced by Brigades such as Karkoo, Wangary, Iron Knob, Willalooka, Carrieton, and Hallett are bushfires so those Brigades are trained and equipped predominantly for such responses, and also receive basic training to get to work on other incident types until a more qualified Brigade arrives.

CFS does not have the luxury of recruiting firefighters from hundreds of applicants and then providing training for a solid six weeks. CFS recruits volunteers from their local communities and as a reflection on the history of CFS achievements will attest, those volunteers are dedicated to their role and succeed in the most trying of circumstances. Of course not all community members who join their local Brigade turn out to be right for the job. They may be well meaning but some learn early in their membership that the demands and nature of being a volunteer firefighter are not for them. Those who stay soon become involved in the extensive range of training courses provided. While all recruits must complete training in basic firefighting skills, most proceed through a range of course include Breathing Apparatus Use, Road Crash Rescue, Hazardous Material Response, Search and Rescue, Structure Firefighting, and Advanced First Aid. Beyond that there is a myriad of courses for every skill a firefighter and Brigade Officer could be expected to know.

No volunteer can devote weeks at a time to training so courses are offered with schedules to accommodate community members with jobs and families to consider. It may take two years for a CFS volunteers to gain the knowledge an MFS recruit gains in six weeks. And much of the valuable training a CFS volunteer receives is on the fireground supervised by an experienced crew member. As a long term volunteer firefighter and volunteer trainer, my mantra is, "The best thing and old firefighter can teach a young firefighter is how to become an old firefighter."

CFS Management and volunteers proudly claim that we serve the community through dedicated volunteers delivering professional fire and rescue services to regional and rural South Australia. A measure of this can be the numerous times MFS and CFS firefighters work together both on major structural fires and major bushfires around the state. Never be surprised if you drive past an MFS Fire Station and see a CFS fire truck parked in it. When MFS has a large fire or numerous fires, CFS Brigades are task to stand by in metropolitan or the city station. Our training enable interoperability which greatly aids or efficiency and effectiveness when responded to an incident.

Next time you pass through a country town or admire the vista of a vast landscape spare a thought for the men and women in that town, or somewhere in that landscape, who will rush to your aid should it be necessary.

South Australia is blessed to have two excellent fire services who have our backs.


